

Kanchan's * Life taking a Positive Uturn

Kanchan is the only child to her parents who belong to a middle-class family. They have been living in Pune as her father employed in Pune. Her mother is a home maker.

Kanchan's plight started when Covid-19 affected the whole world. She also went with her mother to their paternal village in UP due to the lockdown. Her paternal uncle raped her multiple times. When her paternal grandfather got to know about the incident, he also forced her to have sexual relations with him at their farm, but she somehow managed to escape.

Kanchan's mother narrated the incident to her father and he took them back to Pune. Once Kanchan came back to Pune, she penned her agony in a letter to her father. Shockingly, her father too took advantage of this situation and sexually abused her. After joining junior college, Kanchan once shared her story with one of her friends who helped her register a complaint at the police station against her father, uncle and grandfather under the POCSO Act.

FFCP-Muskaan has taken up her case legally. A social worker of FFCP-Muskaan has also been appointed as support person in her case by CWC. Now Kanchan is an adult pursuing her graduation in Computer Science and living alone away from her family in disguise due to safety reasons. FFCP-Muskaan has provided her with assistance for all her basic needs under rehabilitation. This year, she was a part of her college NCC team and performed on Republic Day. She has achieved an SGPA of 8.27 out of 10 in her 1st year exams.

Kanchan dreams of completing her masters, securing a job and eventually bringing her mother to live with her.

BUILDING FAMILY RESILIENCY-SUPPORT FOR COMPLETE SURVIVORSHIP

A long-term rehabilitation program has been one of the new initiatives of FFCP-Muskaan in FY 2023-24. We have financially supported 29 CSA survivors for education, enrolling them in various vocational courses & police training. Our organization has also provided short-term support in the form of dry rations and job referrals to the caregivers of the survivors."

EMPOWERING SNEHA* THROUGH HEALING & HOPE

Sneha, a young girl with hearing impairment, was subjected to sexual abuse that profoundly affected her physical and emotional well-being. Her health deteriorated, and she required extended medical attention due to the traumatic incident she had endured.

After the initial conversation with Sneha, the social worker assessed her needs as follows:

- Ensure Sneha's health and safety.
- Assist Sneha in recording the 161 statement to aid the legal proceedings against her abuser.
- Offer the necessary support to help Sneha cope with the trauma.
- Engage and involve Sneha's mother in the recovery process.
- Explore opportunities to receive financial assistance under Manodhairya for Sneha's future well-being.

Use of storytelling method to record the child's 161 (FIR at Police station) & 164 (Statement in the court) statements: The social worker played a pivotal role in ensuring Sneha's comfort and cooperation during the FIR & court proceedings. Recognizing Sneha's hearing impairment, the social worker employed creative methods, such as storytelling, to help Sneha record her statement. Sneha was encouraged to use sign language during the process to ensure the police accurately recorded her statement.


The traumatic incident experienced by Sneha had deeply impacted her. Regular interactions, counselling, and physical assistance were offered by the social worker to navigate the abuse & facilitate her healing journey.

Recognizing the importance of family support, the social worker actively involved Sneha's mother in the recovery process. Sneha's mother played a crucial role in creating a nurturing and supportive environment for her daughter during her recovery.


As part of Sneha's journey to recovery and empowerment, the social worker initiated plans to assist her in receiving financial support under the "Manodhairya" scheme. This step was vital in securing Sneha's financial independence.

Today, Sneha is back at home, her health has significantly improved, with her emotional state on the path to recovery. The social worker maintains regular contact with Sneha and her mother, offering a safety net and assistance whenever necessary. *NAME CHANGED TO MAINTAIN CONFIDENTIALITY.

She has also enrolled for Diploma in Medical Laboratory Technology (DMLT) from Tech Mahindra under our long-term rehabilitation program. Furthermore, Sunita is benefitting from free legal aid extended by our team.

By immersing herself in a busy schedule of professional training, Sunita has found a way to distance herself from the darkest phase of her life. This not only serves as a coping mechanism but also motivates her to strive for an improved quality of life. The unwavering support of her mother and the intervention by FFCP-Muskaan have collectively paved the way for a new and promising chapter in Sunita's life.

NOURISHING DREAMS FOR A HEALTHIER START



COOKING UP STRENGTH: RECIPES FOR RESILIENCE FOR CSA SURVIVORS

Recipes for Resilience

is one of our therapeutic activities designed for CSA survivors at CCIs. This initiative helped them express their feelings and release their pain simultaneously.

In one of these sessions, our team conducted a bakery workshop where the girls were encouraged to share their memories and emotions with each item they baked. The experience was cathartic for all of them. This session felt like a rainbow platform, guiding them through a spectrum of feelings and memories from their childhood involving friends and family. As an immediate outcome, we observed a sense of relaxation and happiness among the girls. Some of them now dream of starting their own bakery shops once they move forward in life.

COUNSELLING INTERVENTIONS: JOURNEY FROM TRAUMA TO TRIUMPH

This year has marked an enriching episode for our CSA survivors as we added an in-house Psychotherapist to our existing multidisciplinary team. Implementation of professional counselling has played a pivotal role in our ongoing efforts to support survivors of Child Sexual Abuse (CSA).

Recognizing the significance of a comprehensive survivorship approach, we have started home-visit-based counselling and active involvement of parents or immediate caregivers in the counselling process, aiming to expedite the healing journey.





FREEDOM FROM GUILT AND SELF BLAME

Chinu* finds herself engulfed in a storm of emotions, torn between anger, guilt, and shame, as the perpetrator of her distress is none other than her own father. Her family is grappling with financial crises, intensifying the internal conflict for Chinu, who questions the consequences of her decision to report her father given his role as the sole breadwinner. All these challenges drove Chinu to engage in self-harming behaviors and suicidal thoughts.

The counsellor delved into Chinu's unconscious thoughts through projective testing. Instead of directly addressing family issues, Chinu drew a picture of a small girl, a possible representation of her inner self or a symbolic way of expressing vulnerability.

Understanding the urgent need to address Chinu's self-harming tendencies and suicidal thoughts, the counselor guided her to practice positive self-talk aiming to redirect her thought process away from self-destructive tendencies. In addition, the counselor encouraged her to narrate the experience from a third-person perspective, that helped her to facilitate a sense of detachment and explored the incident without overwhelming guilt and selfblame. Chinu is relaxed and has started engaging herself in the various activities and is able to perform her daily activities independently.

PROJECT JAAGO : CREATING A CADRE OF PARA LEGAL VOLUNTEERS AND PARA COUNSELLORS IN THE COMMUNITY

Project Jaago, an initiative by the Foundation for Child Protection - Muskaan (FFCP-Muskaan) in collaboration with the Eaton India Foundation, has been instrumental in addressing the issue of Child Sexual Abuse (CSA) in Pune's communities, specifically Suryaprakash Nagar & Mahatma Gandhi Nagar (PMC) and Vetal Vasti (PCMC). The project, has helped us in creating a cadre of 20 para-legal volunteers and para-counsellors, who are successfully engaged in the community to create awareness on CSA. They have identified more than 12 cases and multiple disclosures and successfully referred it to our case workers to take appropriate actions. As this pilot project nears its completion in March 2024, the focus is now on extending its impact and ensuring sustainability.

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A powerful shift in mindset and gender dynamics within the community.

The collective empowerment of women in the community is evident after their participation in the project activities. The realization that what happened to them should not happen to their children has spurred them to gather courage and collectively fight against CSA.

ADDRESSING GENDER NORMS BY ENGAGING WITH MEN & BOYS TO PREVENT CHILD SEXUAL ABUSE



Growing attention and support from the "Men and Boys" in the community signals a positive shift towards collective responsibility for safeguarding children from sexual abuse

The project's impact is palpable. Notably, Vetal Vasti, once considered unsafe and overlooked by organizations, has experienced a remarkable transformation within a year of intervention. Organizations previously hesitant to engage are now expressing interest in initiating health, education, and livelihood projects, encouraged by the positive changes in community mindset.

PROJECT HAUSLA : FROM LOSS TO LEARNING / CONFIDENCE WITH RESPONSIBILITY

Project Hausla at Boys-OH, Yerwada in partnership with Azim Premji Philanthropic Initiatives aim to expedite the rehabilitation process of children in conflict with the law and provide them with the necessary support to reintegrate into society as law-abiding citizens.

A PATH OF HEALING AND REHABILITATION....

14-year-old Sameer* had just completed his 8th standard and was living with his loving family, consisting of his father, mother, and elder brother. He was at a stage in life where he was curious about many things, like other teenagers. One day, while browsing on his mobile phone, Sameer stumbled upon a pornographic video. Unfortunately, his neighbour aunt caught him watching it. In a moment of panic and embarrassment, Sameer pleaded her not to inform his family about the incident.

The neighbor, however, took advantage of Sameer's vulnerability and started blackmailing him. She demanded that if Sameer wanted her to keep his secret, he would have to kill her mother-in-law. Trapped and frightened, Sameer, under the immense pressure of the situation, ended up taking another person's life by throwing a stone at her head. The consequences were grave, and Sameer was subsequently sent to an observation home for the crime of murder. Sameer was overwhelmed with guilt, stress, and anxiety about his actions. He desperately needed guidance and help to make sense of the situation and find a way towards rehabilitation. The FFCP counsellor initiated the counselling sessions with rapport-building activities, creating a safe and comfortable environment for him to speak freely.


The counsellor used reflective techniques for Sameer to understand and manage his thoughts, behaviours, and actions. He was encouraged to participate during sports, Djembe, dance, and yoga sessions at OH. These activities not only helped him relieve his anxiety but also contributed to his personal growth and development. He slowly found relief from his overwhelming stress and anxiety.



In light of the increasing incidents of child sexual abuse by relatives, Mirror spoke to several social activists, NGOs, and legal experts. They feel the need for maximum eness regarding good and bad touch and its compulsory inclusion in the educa-tional syllabus to prevent the increasing incidents of child sexual abuse. The city has witnessed a rise in child

xual abuse cases in the past five years Speaking to Pune Mirror, Sharmila Raje, director of Muskan, said, "Although the schools and parents are teaching good and bad touch to their children. nore awareness is required. Police and lawyers are there to take care of other things, but to prevent the incidents, each and every child should be aware so that he or she would learn how to keep themives safe. It is of utmost importance to teach them to raise the alarm in case they feel unsafe so that people will also think before abusing children." "Besides awareness, the lesson of safe and unsafe touch should be made compulsory in the school syllabus. Awareness sessions in schools, homes and public places are necessary," she added. Advocate Yashpal Purohit, a practicing lawyer on the panel of Pure District Legal

Aid Service Authonity (DLSA), said, "It has been observed that many people do not even come forward to file complaints. People should speak to their children arly and notice changes in their aviour. They should also keep a watch on the use of mobile phones.

Empowering staff with POCSO awareness session

uskaan conducts enlightening sessions at Kothari International School, focusing on child abuse and the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act.

Pune, India - Kothari International School in Kharadi, Pune, hosted a crucial awareness session on the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) in collaboration with the Foundation for Child Protection - Muskaan. The session aimed to educate the entire school staff about various aspects of child abuse, particularly focusing on child sexual abuse.

The enlightening session saw two parallel sessions tailored for different school departments. One session engaged the Principal, teaching staff, and counselors, facilitated by Ms. Kirti, the Training Coordinator of Foundation for Child Protection - Muskaan. Concurrently, another session catered to the admin department, non-teaching staff, housekeeping staff, bus drivers, and bus lady helpers, led by Ms. Manisha, the Senior Trainer of Foundation for Child Protection - Muskaan.

During the POCSO session, the entire school staff gained insights into critical issues related to child abuse, with a specific focus on child sexual abuse. Causes contributing to child sexual abuse were discussed, along with guidelines on identification, reporting, and legal aspects of POCSO cases. The session shed light on crucial information such as child-friendly police stations and specialized fast-track courts supporting POCSO cases. Notably the gender-neutral nature of the POCSO act was emphasized, promoting inclusivity and a non-judgmental ap-



proach. Various offenses falling under child sexual abuse were also covered in the session.

The session empowered school staff to proactively identify signs and symptoms indicative of child sexual abuse and emphasized the

Children can easily relate to stories told through puppets. Speaking to Pune Times Mirror Sharmila Raje, co-founder and director FCP-Muskaan, said. "We use puppets to talk to children about safe touch and unsafe touch. Young children have a short attention span and their verbal skills are not fully developed. So they do not easily absorb complex information communicated to them purely verbally. Visual stimulation with poppets keeps them engaged for a longer duration and they absorb and retain information communicated to them visually much better. Puppets thus become a highly effective tool to work with young children

FCP-Muskaan is working to prevent child sexual abuse (CSA) and help survivors since the year 2000. It is the only NGO in Pune with full focus on the critical issue of CSA, addressing it with a multidisciplinary approach. Every day, an alarming number of cases of child abuse and assault are reported to the police across the country. As per the latest National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB) data. a large number of cases of aggravated pene-trative sexual assaults covered by the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act are taking place. In these cases, among the victims 38,030 were girls while 414 boys. According to the NCRB report, Uttar Pradesh recorded the highest number of incidents at 8,151, followed by Maharashtra at 7,572, Madhya Pradesh 5,996 Tamil Nadu 4,968, and Rajasthan 3,371. Conversely, the lowest number of POCSO incidents took place in Goa with only 4 cases. Humachal Pradesh 9, Nagaland 26, Arunachal Pradesh 47, and Manipur 55. Delhi witnessed 1,512 incidents under the POCSO Act. Among union territories Jammu & Kashmir had 316 cases, Puducherry 105, Andaman & Nicobar Islands 109, and Dadra & Nagar
